

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About the Test

• Adaptive


- Computer-based
- Assesses Reading and Math skills

How are students tested?

- FAST assessments are computer-adaptive tests taken on a computer or tablet.
- The questions get easier or more difficult depending on how the student responds, and each student will see different questions.

About the Test

- Tests are administered in August/September, December, and May
- Must be completed in one session, in one day
- Different types of questions
 - Multiple choice
 - Multiselect
 - Table match
 - Two-part questions
 - Selectable text
 - Matching
 - Equation editor
 - Editing tasks

Grades 4-8 (Writing)*Everyone is tested in the 2023-24 school year.*
Grades 4-8 (Math)
Grade 5 and 8 (Science)
Civics, Biology, Algebra 1, Geometry EOC

• Students enrolled in Biology 1 must take the EOC assessment, not the grade-level Statewide Science Assessment.

 - Students enrolled in Algebra 1 or Geometry must take the EOC assessment, not the grade-level mathematics assessment.
- Grades 4-8 in Writing * Everyone is tested in the 2023-24 school year.*
- Algebra 1, Geometry, Civics, and Biology EOC

How are students tested?

¿Cómo se evalúan los estudiantes? •Science: Two 80 minute sessions over two days (grade 5). 8th Grade- Two sessions in one day

•Reading: PM1/PM2- Up to 90 minutes, PM3- 120 minutes

•Math: PM1/PM2- Up to 80 minutes, PM3- 100 minutes

Per the Florida Department of Education:

For PM1 and PM2, the Bureau of K–12 Student Assessment provides scheduling guidance in the test administration manual and scripts. For scheduling purposes, a recommended session length is provided, but students who are still working at the end of that time should be provided with the maximum allowable time as indicated in the table above. If students are still working at the end of that time, at the school's discretion, the student may continue until they finish the test (up to the end of the school day). For PM3, students must be provided with the total time indicated in the table.



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
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The diagram below shows that the colonists formed some of their political views from some historical documents.



- For Reading and Math:
 - This year, scores are linked to an FSA equivalent FSA scale until the FAST score scales are set this summer.
 - Students will receive an overall scale score and achievement level for the overall scale score on the equivalent scale.
 - Students will also receive reporting category scale scores and achievement levels for reporting categories
 - Students will receive a percentile rank once the testing window has closed statewide.

Percentile rank: Tells you where your child scored related to the statewide norm.

- Scores range from 1-99, 50 is the average
- Ex. A percentile score of 95 means your child scored as well as or better than 95% of students in the statewide norm.

What do the scores mean?

For Science, students will receive an achievement level score ranging from 1-5, as well as a scale score.

Level 1	Level 2	Level 3	Level 4	Level 5
Inadequate: Highly likely to need substantial support for the next grade	Below Satisfactory: Likely to need substantial support for the next grade	Satisfactory: May need additional support for the next grade	Proficient: Likely to excel in the next grade	Mastery: Highly likely to excel in the next grade




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
How can families help?
